Students don't <u>have</u> to take PSSAs* or Keystones** Parents <u>can</u> opt their children out of these tests.

*Please note, special admit middle and high schools *may* require PSSA scores for admission.

**Students scheduled to graduate in 2019 or later may be required to complete a Project Based Assessment if parents opt them out of the Keystones. The members of the class of 2017 & 2018 are exempt from the Keystone graduation requirement.

Why opt out? (even if your child does well on the tests)

You trust your child's teachers to assess his/her learning.

You feel multiple measures (tests, quizzes, class work, homework, and projects) provide a better picture of your child's abilities than a single, high-stakes standardized test.

You wish classes had more time for assignments that encourage creative, independent thinking.

You'd like for librarians, support staff, extracurricular activities etc. to be funded before tests.

You've seen how the school's climate and appearance change during testing season.

You recognize many smart, talented, successful people don't perform well on standardized tests.

You know children don't come "standardized."

In 2015, the state introduced a new "more rigorous" set of PSSAs aligned to the Pennsylvania Core Standards and designed with the expectation that fewer students will score "proficient" on them.
